Message from the Program Leadership



The 2024 Summer Initiative ran from July 2 to August 22, 2024, with the selection process occurring from January to May 2024.


The 2024-25 Winter Initiative ran from November 20, 2024, with the selection process occurring from June to October 2024.


YIP continues to see a high demand for the program, highlighting increasing youth engagement and sustained interest in the experiences and opportunities available!


Gender and Identity

Candidates could self-identify as female, fluid, male, nonbinary, transgender, two-spirited, not specified above, and/or prefer not to answer. Of Student hires:




Sexual Orientation

Racial Ethnicity



CAN Conference

The CAN Conference provided opportunities for YIP students and alumni to engage in community involvement, advocacy, and networking.

- In the summer, the event attracted over 250 attendees with 30 booths, while the winter session had 300+ attendees, also featuring 30 booths!
- Participants connected with various organizations and explored opportunities within the Durham Region

Wellness Event

The event aimed to promote positive mental health for YIP students by offering a variety of activities.

 YIP students participated in rotations throughout the day, engaging in collaborative practices that included an active boot camp, mindful meditation, pet therapy, henna art, painting, and Seeds 4 Tomorrow workshops.

Mock Trial

YIP hosted its first-ever Mock Trial event for members to apply what they've learned throughout the program in a criminal justice setting!

- Participants stepped into the courtroom experience, taking on various legal roles and gaining firsthand insight into the trial process, from case preparation to courtroom procedures.
- A lawyer, a judge, and a DRPS detective joined the event, offering expert guidance and real-world perspectives on the justice system.

Hearth Place Fundraiser

Established in 1997, the Hearth Place Cancer Support Centre has provided vital support to individuals affected by cancer across Canada.

- Over the summer, YIP members raised **\$10,500** to contribute to this cause.
- Additionally, the team participated in a Boston Pizza (Ajax) Celebrity Server Night, raising over \$300 to further support the initiative.

The program has worked with over **80** Community Organizations and Public Safety Partners to support program delivery and events

Coldest Night of the Year Fundraiser

The Coldest Night of the Year is a national event raising awareness of homelessness in Canada.

- This winter, YIP partnered with The Refuge to support rural and northern areas of Durham Region.
- YIP members raised **\$15,572.20** over the winter and also participated in a Boston Pizza (Whitby) Celebrity Server Night, raising over \$100 to support the cause.

Junior YIP Leadership Camp

YIP hosted its 15th annual Junior Youth In Policing Leadership Camp at the Donald A Wilson Secondary School marking the largest turnout in years with 94 campers.

- The camp focuses on empowering younger community members to become future ambassadors of change. This year's theme, LEAD, taught campers valuable skills to Listen, Encourage, Adapt, and Devote.
- The campers were paired with YIP students, participating in teambuilding, educational activities, and engaging with various police units and emergency services, including DRPS Canine, Forensics, and Whitby Fire.
